
News, Clues & Rumors:

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



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

New Hot Wheels Model Hits The Shelves

A brand-new 1/18th scale Pantera model has suddenly hit the shelves of toy stores and chain stores everywhere. The model, available only in red, is from Mattel/Hot Wheels, and is a build-it-yourself version of the popular already-assembled replicas which have been available for a year or so (but which

have been discontinued, and thus are more and more difficult to find).

The model is an almost perfect reproduction of Gary Hall's "Big Red", an early Pantera converted to GT/4 specifications. Ironically, the suggested retail price is much higher than the previous issue—you have to pay more to build it yourself!

These models are being marketed to retailers in a rather bizarre fashion, making them virtually impossible to special-order. Retailers simply order a case of models, and inside the box is a

random collection of cars, which may or may not include the Pantera. It will take some diligence to find one on the shelf, and since they are being marketed in a very limited run, once they are gone, there will likely be no more.

Back at the Lodge, Tony was hustling to ensure the final preparations were completed for the big luau. Eventually




