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Minutes of Meeting 26 January, 2006

The meeting was called to order by the new club president, Gary Kono. All officers were present except for John Hansen, Bob Benson and Howard Renshaw. Turnout was light; there were 27 people at the meeting and only two Panteras were in the parking lot.

Johnny is one of the world's most well-known Pantera owners, as he is a regular at the Las Vegas event, and his self-restored Pantera has been featured in numerous British magazines. He came to the Bay Area to escape the dreadful British winter weather, and ostensibly to help Mike Drew work on his Pantera (although it didn't turn out that way, as they were too busy visiting other club members to actually bother working on the car!)

Rich Taylor, a friend of Rich Boschert, just bought Don Baul's 1972 pre-L Pantera, #3539. The car had some critical maintenance issues (such as a terribly worn rear axle) but now that they have been overcome, Rich is using it as a daily driver!

The general consensus was that the resultant shirt would be too 'busy', so we will be designing a second shirt to celebrate the aforementioned anniversaries.

<u>Team Pantera of Orange County Willow Springs Track Event — 4-5 March</u>: This TPOC Open Track event will be featuring Panteras and Ferraris on the track that is widely know as "the fastest track in the West". It is often used by magazines for performing evaluations of cars, and is also regularly used in television commercials. This event is for pro and novice alike

<u>Pre-Las Vegas Tech Session</u> — <u>22 April</u>: Roger and Pam Sharp will once again open their homes to us and host the traditional pre-Vegas tech session. Larry Stock will be attending and will be bringing many parts down from Reno, but if you have any specific jobs in mind, please contact him ahead of time to ensure that he brings the parts you need. You must pre-coordinate for air conditioning service, otherwise he will not bother dragging his stash of R-12 and R-134.

<u>Las Vegas Fun Rally — May 3-7</u>: The 'early bird' deadline for a \$20 discount on the cost of the event has now passed. Even if you're unsure if you will be able to attend, *now* is the time to be picking up the phone and making your hotel reservations, and putting pen to paper and filling out your registration form and sending your check to Kent Snyder. You can always back out for a full refund if you need to.

Be advised when making your hotel reservations that you need to spell out P-O-C-A in order to get the proper discounted rate. By coincidence, there is a *polka* group holding a convention at the hotel at the same time, and their rooms are all sold out! Kent Snyder found this out when he called to make his own room reservation for his own event and initially was told that they had no rooms remaining for his group!

Marcus Smith was at the meeting and volunteered to host an enroute brunch at his home in Pine Grove, so that is the probable 'scenic route' that we will take, but of course it is all dependent upon the weather. Stay tuned for updates in the next few months.

<u>Las Vegas Speed Trials</u> — <u>May 4-5</u>: Larry Finch is fine-tuning the track event arrangements. This year's t-shirt design is courtesy of Chuck Engles in Oklahoma City. We will be running on the same track as last year (the 'short' track), but will hopefully have access to the full 3.7 mile long course for the lunch time drive-around. Our cost to run the longer track would increase by \$2250 each day, which means the participant registration cost would go up by \$150 (for both days), so for now, we're sticking with what we have. We will take a poll of the drivers this year and ask them what their thoughts are; if enough of them are willing to commit to running the long course, we will seriously explore expanding the event for next year.

The caterers that we used last year are unavailable for us this year, so Larry is hunting down alternate food and beverage sources. The track workers and ambulance service are both dialed in; we are importing our track workers from the Los Angeles area this year, but even including the hotel expenses we are incurring on their behalf, we are actually saving money compared to the cost of the local workers last year.

There was discussion about having a no-kidding fire truck from the local fire department positioned at the track, but doing so would add \$1500 to the cost of the event, so that idea was rejected as unnecessary and impractical, given that the town fire department is just a mile away from the track.

There will be *no* tech inspections conducted at the track this year; instead, drivers will be required to have their cars inspected prior to the event. A list of approved inspection site will appear in the next POCA newsletter, and is also featured on our website.

<u>Monterey Historics Races/Concorso Italiano</u> — <u>17-20 August</u>: Last year, a few people got confused and accidentally registered with Pantera International, thinking that they were registering with us! When they became aware of their mistake, they were told there were no refunds, so they were forced to stay in downtown Monterey. To alleviate this problem, we will

generate much more advance publicity for the event in the POCA newsletter. Also, instead of tightly holding onto the rooms for PCNC members only until a relatively late date, we will instead only offer an exclusive arrangement until the end of February, at which point registration will be opened up to all POCA members. A \$100 deposit is required to hold your room; the event costs are still being worked out but will likely be very similar to last year.

One of the themes of the Concorso Italiano is the 35th anniversary of the Pantera, so it stands to reason that there will be a higher-than-normal number of De Tomaso devotees present, so plan accordingly!

Among the items discussed was a proposed plan to combine *Profiles* and the POCA newsletter into one bi-monthly publication. Almost a dozen Panteras and one Mangusta graced the Sharp's expansive driveway, joined by such esoteric machinery as a painstakingly hand-crafted perfect replica of a 1954 Jaguar Dtype race car, and a Triumphbased Rat Rod featuring with a Mustang motor under the hood!

As everyone had brought a dish to share, the kitchen was

filled to the point of bursting with different types of foods and desserts. The grill was going almost from the start, and periodically somebody would circulate with a platter of spicy

> Dianne Dean's Pantera was having taillight issues, which are normally fairly easily sorted out (such problems are almost always due to either a poor connection at the wiring harness junction block, or a faulty ground). Tom Galli spent a fair bit of time trying to sort things out, with no success unfortunately. As an in-depth probing was outside the scope of this party, the problem was left to be dealt with another day.

Steve Dalcino was having rear wheel bearing issues; he had shipped his uprights to Larry Stock to have new bearings installed, but felt that there was undue play remaining on one side.

Guy Dellavecchia's Triumph drew a lot of curious onlookers as well as admirers. This decidedly anti-establishment ride is a hodgepodge of parts from various sources; the basic Triumph shell has been equipped with the independent front suspension from a Mustang II, which also donated its 302 V-8 and transmission to the cause. The sidepipes were cobbled together from scraps (as, indeed, was the entire car), and the home-made roll bar is merely resting in place, neither bolted nor welded (same for the driver's seat). The tires are dry-rotted and bald, and the brakes? Well, let's just hope it has some.

The hotted-up motor generates more than 300 horsepower and the car weighs around 1900 pounds, so it certainly scoots right along, capable of top speeds in the 175 mph range.


forth, it will require a vote of the club members and won't take effect until next year.
