
<u>Changes To Last Month's Minutes</u>: There were no changes noted.


<u>Club Treasury Report</u>: As Jim was absent, there was no report; rumor has it that we still have money however!

Upcoming Events:

<u>Nor-Cal Shelby Club Mini-Nats</u> — <u>22-24 September</u>: The annual convention of the Nor-Cal Shelby Club (which welcomes De Tomaso cars with open arms) will be held at Sears Point. See the club's website (www.norcal-saac.org) for all the information.

<u>Comedy Day In Golden Gate Park — 1 October</u>: The automotive portion of the event is staged by a local Ferrari owner, but all De Tomaso cars are invited. Those who display their cars alongside the stage are provided with free VIP tickets to the show, dinner, wine, and a backstage



pass. In previous years, major-league comedy starts like Robin Williams, Dave Chappelle, Dave Attell and others have participated. All-Italian Car And Motorcycle Show — 8 October: This show is hosted by the Alfa Romeo club and is a benefit for the Alameda Special Olympics. Basically a Concorso Italiano Lite, this low-key car show has been supported to varying degrees by PCNC in the past, with as many as a dozen Panteras appearing one year, and only one appearing other years. Typically there are between 100 and 200 cars present. The event is free for exhibitors, and only costs \$5 for spectators. Italian music and excellent food are on tap as well. <u>Washington Square Columbus Day Car Show — 8 October</u>: Once again sadly conflicting with the above event, this car show is for Italian exotics only. The cars are displayed in a cordoned-off area of Washington Square in San Francisco, along the route of the annual Columbus Day parade. Those who display their cars are given a free bottle of wine and lunch.

<u>Journey To The Gentrys</u> — <u>14-15 October</u>: Brian and Kathy Gentry will once again be hosting the club at their home in Paso Robles; the club will make it an overnight event with wine tasting etc. As this is somewhat short notice, there is no flyer available yet for inclusion in the newsletter, but the information should be on the PCNC website soon.

<u>Thunderhill Track Day — 19 October</u>: Although not, strictly speaking, a PCNC event, a number of PCNC members have decided to run their cars at Thunderhill on 19 October. Because it's a midweek date, the number of participants is low, which means track time is unusually high. Bob Benson is corralling the Pantera participants, so if you're interested, let him know! Although the event is technically now 'full', it's always possible that one or more people may drop out, so definitely inquire if you'd like to participate. Spectators are welcome also! Club Business:

Club Bylaws Change?: Russ Britschgi brought up a proposal to change the PCNC bylaws and change the way the club does business. The proposal involves splitting up the existing duties of the newsletter editor and secretary, and making them two separate positions; doing so would create an odd number of people on the board, so the solution would be to convert an existing appointed position to an elected one, for a total of seven board members. Discussion became quite heated, and it became apparent that the topic needed to be considered by the existing board first, so discussion was tabled. Buy/Sell/Swap:

Steering Column Bushing: Although not strictly for sale, Mike showed off an oillite bush-

ing intended to replace a fiber bushing which is located inside the steering column, under the dashboard. When an aftermarket steering wheel is installed, the hub is often just short enough that tightening down the nut cracks the stock bushing, and the result is about 1/4" to 1/2" of annoying in-and-out movement of the steering wheel. This replacement bushing is only available from Pantera Performance Center. Although Mike brought it just for show-and-tell, victims of the syndrome instantly offered to buy it on the spot and Darryl Johnson was the first to successfully reach his wallet.

The bushings are available from Dennis Quella and cost a mere \$16. Watch for an in-depth technical article on this and other good improvements to make upstream of the steering rack, sometime this winter.

Ansell Gloves: Mike also showed off a nifty pair of work gloves that he received from a Pantera owner in France. Made by an outfit called Ansell, which is the world's largest producer of specialty work gloves, they are called the HyFlex NBR 11-900. They feature a super-grippy nitrile palm and finger surface with a fine gauge knit liner. Abrasion resistance and oil repellency are the key characteristics of this glove. The nitrile coating prevents oil from penetrating through the glove, protecting hands from dermatitis. The glove has excellent dry grip for applications involving small-to-medium-sized parts. Also, the glove provides excellent abrasion resistance with additional protection for the back of the hand.

They are available from many different online sources, with prices as low as \$34 for a dozen pairs, in sizes 6 through 10. Although they are cheap enough to be considered disposable, they are actually washable and reuseable.


News, Clues and Rumors:

The Proposal to Make Changes in the PCNC By-Laws

In January of this year the PCNC Board of Directors (the five elected officers) along with the Appointed Officers (the seven appointed positions) met and discussed the prospect of splitting the tasks of the Secretary into two different positions. Currently the Secretary does the normal tasks expected of a club secretary but is also responsible for editing and publishing the newsletter. It was the feeling of the Board at that meeting that dividing the task in two would be beneficial to the club as it would lessen the work load on the member currently doing both tasks and would also allow an opportunity for more members to get involved with the operation of this POCA chapter.

At the same meeting the current Secretary said that if this goes forth then he would really like to be the person who does the newsletter editing work. This was acceptable to the Board. Plus he also would really like to continue to be a voting member of the Board. Thus since only the elected officers have the right to vote at Board meetings, any new position of newsletter editor / publisher would have to become an elected position. This was acceptable to the Board, but it also raised the problem of having a board with an even number of members. This would be contrary to the logic of having an odd number to prevent possible tie votes.

Since PCNC just had an election of officers it was felt that there was no need to rush into making the needed By-Law changes till prior to the fall elections. The problem in setting the number of elected officers at an odd number was left hanging. Thus the idea was floated at the last Club meeting that the appointed positions of Events Coordinator be changed to an elected position.

After the close of that regular meeting there was a short meeting of the Board along with the Appointed Officers for the purpose of discussing any and all changes. It should be noted that the Board voted three to one not to recommend any changes, but when the Appointed Officers were poled the majority went the other way. Thus it was recommended that this item be brought before the general membership without a recommendation for acceptance by the Board.

Thus we now need to follow the procedure in Article VII, Section 2:

Proposed amendments or changes to these By-Laws shall be printed in the PCNC Newsletter and shall be mailed to the general membership at least two weeks prior to any meeting at which said amendments or changes are to be open for discussion and review. At said meeting the proposed amendments or changes may themselves also be changed or modified by a majority vote, and after said meeting the proposed amendments or changes as modified or not shall be printed in their final form in the PCNC Newsletter, and again shall be mailed to the general membership at least two weeks prior to the next meeting. At this second meeting the proposed amendments or changes shall either be accepted or rejected by a majority vote. Special mailings ...

Therefore at the regularly scheduled September club meeting the following proposed changes to the PCNC By-Laws shall be discussed and modified at the will of the majority of the members present. A vote to accept or reject the proposed changes will not be taken till the October membership meeting to allow the proposed changes as modified (or not) at the September meeting to have again been published.

The proposed changes, with deletions in strike thru print and additions in bold italic print, are:

ARTICLE IV Officers and Directors

Section 1. Officers.

- a) The officers of PCNC shall be the President, the Vice-President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, **the Newsletter Editor & Publisher, the Events Coordinator**, and the Membership Coordinator.
- b) Collectively these five **seven** (5 **7**] officers constitute the Board of Directors (Directors) of PCNC.

Section 6. Secretary.

- a) The Secretary shall keep a corrected book of minutes of all the meetings of the Directors and of the Members; with the time and place of the meeting, how called or authorized, the notice thereof given, the names of those present at Directors' meetings, the number of members present or represented at Members' meetings, and the proceedings thereof.
- b) The Secretary shall keep a current roster and mailing list showing the names and addresses of the Members of PCNC.
- c) The Secretary shall prepare and mail PCNC's monthly Newsletter. Items to be included in the Newsletter are: a summary of the monthly meetings, events' flyers, a calendar of events, articles submitted by PCNC's members, PCNC's Store items, new members' names, address changes, and other material of interest to PCNC and its Members.
- d) The Secretary shall keep and maintain all PCNC records not of a financial nature, and all correspondence, and the official copy of the By-Laws.

Section 9. Newsletter Editor & Publisher.

- a) The Newsletter Editor & Publisher shall prepare and mail PCNC's monthly Newsletter. Items to be included in the Newsletter are: a summary of the monthly meetings, events' flyers, a calendar of events, articles submitted by PCNC's members, PCNC's Store items, new members' names, address changes, and other material of interest to PCNC and its Members.
- b) The Newsletter Editor & Publisher shall maintain a file, either in an electronic or printed format, of all published newsletters.

Section 10. Events Coordinator.

- a) The Events Coordinator shall work with each event host to ensure that planning, publicity, and insurance are all in place.
- b) The Events Coordinator shall also maintain an Events File of past events held by PCNC. Such a file shall contain information that would be helpful in planning future events similar to those in the file.



Beating The Heat

Over the last few days I noticed a boiling/percolating sound coming from my coolant tanks (pressure and swirl tanks). The tanks sat there vibrating as the contents sounded like they were boiling, but I hadn't detected any fluids being discharged from the overflow hose. And, the temp gauge still showed consistent temperature readings, albeit with a few erratic swings of the needle (but no alarming temperatures reported).

Notes on my Cooling System

Last year I installed...

- Brand new radiator stock style copper/brass, no leaks
- 2. Weiand aluminum water pump
- Rebuilt the stock cooling fans (with Cortina blades)—they work beautifully
- A Tefba coolant filter—filter is clean, with no obstruction to flow

Additional notes...

- Temperature sender was mounted in the water pump
- Cooling system had been bled twice since the symptoms appeared—very little air
- 3. And, it didn't appear to be losing coolant—fluid level appeared constant

Anyway, I posted my dilemma to the De Tomaso E-Mail Forum and received a lot of questions and suggestions which helped me determine the best course of action to resolve the problem.

I picked up an Infra-red temperature gun on my way home from work and checked temperatures at various points along the cooling system to determine if coolant temps were consistent throughout. They were not. It appeared the most likely culprit was a stuck thermostat due to the large temperature difference between the coolant bottle and the radiator, and the fact that once I removed the cap from the pressure tank it immediately boiled over. This led me to believe the coolant was merely circulating through the engine instead of through the radiator.

Correct 351 Cleveland Thermostats

The thermostat for a 351 Cleveland is different from the thermostat for a 351 Windsor. Either will fit in each

A proper 351C thermostat has a 'hat' which seals the bypass orifice which is located in the block immediately underneath the thermostat housing. If a conventional thermostat is used, a large percentage of the radiator fluid will never make it to the radiator, and will instead just keep circulating around and around inside the engine

engine, but the 351C thermostat has a copper "hat" that seals against a bypass restrictor plate inside the block, closing the bypass circuit when the thermostat opens, so that all coolant has to go through the radiator.

Those thermostats in the chart marked as "Cleveland-specific" have been verified to be correct 351C thermostat with the hat to seal the bypass circuit in the block. I used a Stant #29468 thermostat because that's what was available from my local Kragen's auto parts store. I also used a thin coat of Permatex #2 gasket sealer on the gasket surface to ensure a water-tight seal.

I have since learned that I didn't need to use a Cleveland-specific thermostat in my car, since my Weiand aluminum water pump does not have the bypass circuit. Therefore, if you have a Weiand aluminum water pump, you could use a standard Windsor thermostat, like the one I removed.




The hole on the right side of this standard Ford water pump is at the other end of the bypass passage; this is how the water circulates through the motor when the engine is cold


Temperature Sender Relocation

Panteras came from the factory with the temperature sender mounted in the side of the pressure tank rather than the engine. This is a poor location for the temp sender because it doesn't actually gauge engine temperature, and worse, if the car loses coolant the sender will only report the air temperature in the tank and not the temperature of the overheating engine. My car now has a drain petcock installed in the pressure tank in the original temp sender location. It allowed me to drain just the top of the cooling system so I could easily change the thermostat.

A previous owner of my car moved the temperature sender to the water pump, which is also a less-than-ideal location, because It sees cavitation off the pump impeller tips and temp readings from a bubble mix is bound to be non-linear. Therefore, I decided it was time to relocate the temperature sender from the

water pump to the correct location in the block, directly beneath the thermostat. There's a 1/2" pipe plug there already, so it was merely a matter of moving the pipe plug to the water pump and moving the temp sender to the block. In the picture above you can see the temp sender is now mounted in the block above the water pump and directly beneath the thermostat. This location will yield the most accurate and consistent temperature readings.

The temperature readings before and after the new thermostat was installed can be seen in the chart at the bottom of this page.

Summary

There's no more boiling coolant in the pressure tank. All overheating symptoms are gone! And, my stock Veglia temp gauge appears to be spot-on (within 2-3 degrees). From a cold start, the gauge climbs to about 180, then drops back down near 90, then climbs back up, and goes through this cycle several times until

the coolant temperature is equalized throughout the system.

Now I just need to get used to the higher gauge readings since I went from a 160-degree thermostat to a 180-degree thermostat. When my gauge used to register only 160 degrees, I doubted its accuracy fearing that it read low. However, its performance is consistent with what it used to be, but at 180 degrees now rather than 160 degrees. And, I've verified it with the IR temp gun. One more thing; I also backed off the timing advance by 2-3-degrees to avoid engine knock.
