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Minutes of Meeting 26 August, 2010

The meeting was called to order by the president a few minutes early, due to the fact that remodeling crews were going to be hard at work through the night, and the management wanted us to vacate the room as soon as possible. All officers were present except for Trevor Fougere, Brent Stewart and Gary Kono. 42 members signed the roster, and there were ten Panteras plus a Mangusta in the parking lot.

New Members/Guests: The club welcomed **Bill Asbury**, who is the original owner of his yellow 1973 Pantera L, #6027. It has been sitting for awhile, but he hopes to get it running again soon. We were also joined by **Tony Guinasso**, who has a white '73L. Tony owns a repair shop in San Mateo, and while he has successfully worked on other people's Panteras lately, his car lies derelict on top of a stacker lift. He's starting to get the fever again though, and hopefully we will see

it on the road again soon as well!

<u>Changes To Last Month's Minutes</u>: John Cho's name was misspelled "Jon", and Kevin Abbey issued a clarification regarding his ability to sign off fix-it tickets. Make sure your car is actually fixed!

<u>Club Store Report</u>: Rich brought new PCNC hats to the meeting; the baseball hats can either be had with the Pantera script (\$10) or PCNC logo (\$15).

<u>Club Treasury Report</u>: After all was said and done, between the staging of the Monterey Motorsports Reunion parking corral, and the PCNC dinner and hotel at Los Laureles, the club made a small (\$30) profit, effectively breaking even, which is the goal for all our events. Well-done!

<u>Club Membership Report</u>: The membership report was tabled pending the expected late arrival of Brent Stewart, who was busy having a new exhaust system crafted for his Pantera. Unfortunately the project continued well into the evening, and thus he wasn't able to attend.

<u>Club Name Badge Report</u>: Bob announced that he wasn't getting word from Brent when new members join the club, so he hasn't been producing any new badges for them. He is going to talk to Brent and work out a system to ensure he stays in the loop from now on.

<u>Club Motorsports Report</u>: Larry reported that the Laguna Seca corral was a great success, with 16 Panteras and two Mangustas present. There were also a couple of non-De Tomaso cars in our corral, brought by POCA members. Larry is going to inquire to see if he can convince the track management to improve the area where we park, by having it graded, oiled etc.

Larry has also inquired with both the Fernley and Pahrump tracks regarding costs to stage a track event for next year's Fun Rally. He is gathering quotes and will be able to conjure up a plan once a location and date are selected for the Fun Rally. He has also been communicating with Mike Becker of San Diego Panteras; the SDP crowd is doing the homework to see if the Fun Rally could be staged somewhere in their area. Unfortunately the nearest track is Fontana, which is 90 miles away, and prohibitively expensive—more than twice as expensive as the previous two locations, meaning we simply wouldn't be able to afford to stage a track event there.

<u>Club Library Report</u>: Forest has finished going through the boxes of documents, magazines, newsletters etc. and has placed a summary of the library contents on a spreadsheet, visible on the club website. People can arrange to borrow items from the club library, but they will sign for them and be responsible for returning them in a timely manner. Most of the contents are old *Pantera International* magazines, donated by Rich Agiorni. Forest is seeking contributions, so please contact him if you have items you would be willing to donate to the club.

<u>Club Website Report</u>: Besides updating the events page, Mark has also placed the club library contents online.

Past Events:

Monterey Weekend: A total of 56 people attended our dinner at the Los Laureles Lodge, with a substantial percentage volunteering to help with staging the event. Over a dozen people worked to greater or lesser degrees to pull things off. Forest and Judy Goodhart and Kevin and Valerie Abbey each won \$50 gift certificates from the PCNC store.

PCNC members also did well in the concours at Concorso Italiano; Darryl Johnson took first place in the Modified Custom class, and Forest Goodhart was awarded Best Paint.

Several club members decided to forgo the more conventional events (Pebble Beach, historic races etc.) in favor of the Concours d'Lemons, a car show celebrating the oddball, mundane and truly awful of the automotive world.

Rocky Mountain Rumble: Mike Drew flew up to Washington state, and joined John Christian in his '74 Pantera to attend the Rocky Mountain Rumble, a weeklong tour of the Canadian Rockies put on jointly by several loosely affiliated Canadian Pantera owners. 18 Panteras, plus a Lamborghini Countach Anniversary Edition, and a Series I Lamborghini Espada, took part in the tour. The highlight was a visit to a reclusive car collector's extensive collection in the Calgary area; besides his two GT40s, Lamborghini Muiras and Countach, Ferrari F40, original 289 and 427 Cobras, etc. etc. and so forth, he also owns both an 'ordinary' Mangusta and the one-off Mangusta Spyder prototype, and a pair of one-off De Tomaso sports-racing cars from the mid-1960s.

Boston Market Car Show: A small local show has grown to have more than 200 cars each week, including several Panteras. Bob Benson reported that there were four Panteras and a Mangusta at the last show; a raffle is held each week with the winner taking home anywhere from \$500 to \$900!

Upcoming Events:

<u>Blessing Of The Hot Rods — 18 September</u>: There are a few non-club events of note; September 18th is the second annual "Blessing Of The Hot Rods", a free event staged by a church in Los Gatos. <u>Comedy Day In Golden Gate Park — 19 September: Comedy Day is a free outdoor comedy concert featuring nearly 30 of today's top</u> performers. It was founded in 1981 as a way for Bay Area comics to say thank you to comedy fans for their support and to The City that has nurtured so many comedians.

Roland Au is one of the event organizers, and arranges for Ferrari and Pantera owners to get the full VIP treatment; Mark McWhinney organizes the PCNC contingent. In exchange for displaying our cars in Sharon Meadows, we are given preferred seating right in front of the stage, free lunch and free drinks. More information can be found on the PCNC website. PCNC Drive To Reedyville — **25-26 September**: Greg Taylor has organized a weekend outing to Placerville, east of Sacramento on the way to Lake Tahoe. The group will depart from a meeting point at Crow Canyon Road and Hwy 680 at 9:00 a.m., take mountain back roads and arrive at Reedyville at 1:00 p.m. There, Steve Reedy has built his own fantasy park, complete with live steam railroad, old west town, mineshaft, etc. There will be swimming available also.

On Saturday night, Greg is planning a dinner at the Sutter Street Steakhouse in Old Sacramento; there is also a street festival called Folsom Live, featuring live bands etc.

For those who want to make a weekend of it, an overnight stay at the Courtyard by Marriott (rooms are \$89, with ten rooms blocked off, just say "Car Show") then sets them up to participate in EuroSunday, a monthly car show in Sacramento of European-only cars. The location varies; on this particular weekend it will be held at Folsom at the Broadstone Marketplace (2760)

East Bidwell Street, Folsom, CA 95630) between 8:00 a.m. and 10:30 a.m. This location is only a mile from the hotel.

All-Italian Car Show In Alameda — 10 October: Doug Abadie will once again be serving as the De Tomaso honcho for this fantastic show, which is a benefit held each year for the Alameda Special Olympics. It is sort of a Concorso Italiano Lite, with all sorts of Italian cars and motorcycles on display on the lawn at Lincoln Middle School in Alameda. This is a very laid-back, low-key event, with great food and music, and a very low cost. There is a flyer elsewhere in this newsletter, and of course all the information will be available on the PCNC website; contact Doug if you're planning on attending and he will try to set aside parking for you. The deadline for pre-registration is nominally September 17th, but it is likely they will happily accept signups after that date, especially in light of the fact that it is also possible to sign up at the event itself.

Sunday, September 19, 2010 Sharon Meadows in Golden Gate Park




The cost is \$0 (zilch, nada, nil, squat) and includes lunch, open bar, VIP seating, and backstage passes. It is hard to beat this deal!
