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Minutes of Meeting 22 May, 2014

The meeting was called to order by the president at 8:00 p.m. sharp. All officers were present except for Greg Taylor and Denny Morse. Turnout was a bit light, with only 24 members present, but there were five Panteras in the parking lot.

<u>Changes To Last Month's Minutes</u>: Bob Benson's address was printed incorrectly on the masthead (it has been corrected for this issue). There were also one or two minor typos, but no substantive changes noted.

<u>Club Treasury Report: We received our first quarter rebate</u> from POCA, and deposited \$45 collected at the Boschert tech session. Checks were written to pay for the roster printing, and the website domain renewal. All in all, the treasury remains on a slight upward trajectory.

We will soon be filing an application with the IRS to become a 501c(7) non-profit organization. The application is 19 pages long (!), and the cost to apply may be as much as \$400. Yikes...well, that's one way to ensure we don't have any profit at least!

<u>Club Store Report</u>: The contents of the club store were all boxed up and ready to be transported to the Fun Rally via the president's SUV.




Pre-Fun Rally Tech Session

On a beautiful Saturday in May, Rich Boschert was kind enough to host a tech session at his incredible home in Los Gatos. Rich's home is incredible not because it's a McMansion (as are some of the homes in his area), but rather because it's an untouched throwback to a bygone age, when Los Gatos was truly 'country'. A modest house faces the street, and at the end of the very, very long lot, past a barn converted to a garage, there are oldschool workshops, the kind with sliding doors suspended from above, or even no doors at all.

Within are endless toolboxes with everything you could need to fix (or break) just about anything imaginable.

Rich's place is a sort of clubhouse for neighborhood motorheads, and there were a couple of performance Mopars up in the air being wrenched on all day, and a turbocharged SVO Mustang even appeared for awhile.

Ostensibly the tech session was intended to perform repairs to cars destined for the long drive to the POCA Fun Rally in San Diego, but those planning on making the trek showed an unusual degree of confidence in their cars, and stayed away in droves. This afforded the

opportunity for others to have their Panteras worked on instead.

Lee Scales' Pantera had demonstrably suffered from a distinctly non-working carburetor, as evidenced by the great improvement when Rich Boschert's loaner carb from his Dodge tunnel-ram setup was set atop the Pantera intake manifold. That carb unfortunately had secondaries that were out to lunch, so at this tech session, the loaner was removed and replaced with the other carb from the Dodge.

Along the way, several other problems were found and fixed on Lee's car, includ-

ing broken muffler hangars and loose driveshaft bolts. As usual, Rich was a veritable mechanical dervish, constantly jumping into and out of and un-

der the car, a blur of activity and focused energy!

Speaking of energy, Rich's father is a bit of a mad scientist with a pas-

sion for electricity, and he had numerous electrical gadgets on display, including one that, if touched, would make all your hand stand on end as it

passed a jillion volts through your body!

Fairly early on in the proceedings, time was called and everybody gathered around the grille. Hot links and burgers were laid out, along with a bunch of other munchies and desserts. So far only one Pantera had been worked on, but the dozen or more people were enjoying themselves just fine.

I had brought my Pantera driveshafts and new U-joints in a box. Although I have all the tools necessary to change them myself, I lacked the confidence to tackle the job on my own, and wanted some adult supervision. Forest Goodhart has been at it for more years than I've been alive, and he was eager to help.

Very quickly, eagerness gave way to dismay, as one of the new U-joint caps ruptured when it was pressed together. This meant I wouldn't be able to complete the task, but at least we could get partway there. More troubles made themselves known after we got the first U-joint installed; it turns out a previous owner had installed a replacement U-joint and evidently broke two of the four caps, and lacking suitable replacements, chose to fit smaller caps with sleeves to make up the difference. We hadn't seen them, and now the sleeves had fallen in and were touching the U-joint cross and preventing proper movement. So it all had to come apart again, whereupon a second cap broke!

Putting them all together again, a roller fell over into the bottom of a cap and punched right through, for a total of three wrecked caps! Forest was mortified (he has been changing U-joints since forever and had *never* broken one, much less three), but under the circum-

stances I can't see what we could have done differently. Sometimes, stuff just happens....

Having run out of U-joints to break, we turned our attention to Lori's car, which has had a distinctly tappety sound in the engine for years. She climbed in the engine bay to pull a valve cover, but soon Forest was all over it, feeling around and removing unseen bolts in a rapid fashion. With the valve cover off, we started the engine, and saw seven rocker arms merrily rocking, and one just sort of ambling up and down, moving hardly at all. Although we didn't dive in any further, the consensus is that this is not merely a flaccid lifter; the camshaft is probably shot.


As the engine has 95K miles on it, it would be pointless to just change the cam. A full engine rebuild is therefore on the cards, but as an interim step, she'd like to get a temporary engine to get the car back on the road, so she can rebuild her engine in a leisurely fashion. Does anybody know of a running

351C engine that could be had cheaply, or merely borrowed for a few months?

John Columbero's Pantera was suffering from clutch hydraulic woes, and he was unable to bring the car to the event. Several of us planned to swing by his house after work was complete to try to sort it out, but sadly the day stretched so long that there simply wasn't time. Fortunately Brent Stewart was able to drop by the next day, and discovered that the system was empty. He filled it up and bled it, and it seemed to work fine, although one has to wonder where the clutch fluid had gone, and how long the new fluid would remain on board before the clutch failed again?

Anyway, at the end of the day, everybody drove home happily, and the Panteras present were either in better shape than when they arrived, or at least questions had been answered so plans could be established to get them back to good health.

Thanks to Rich and his father for opening their home up to us!
